## Making an appointment with Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) – for Non-EU students


- The appointment must be made by the individual registering through the ISD digital portal and can be done now that you have arrived in Ireland.
- Online booking portal:
  - <a href="https://burghquayregistrationoffice.inis.gov.ie">https://burghquayregistrationoffice.inis.gov.ie</a>
- Your Appointment will be at the Burgh Quay Registration Office:
  - 13-14 Burgh Quay, Dublin 2, D02 XK70, Ireland
  - Arrive 10 minutes early!
- Sometimes it can be difficult to secure an appointment at busy times of the year. If you are unable to book an appointment within the 90 period don't worry, your permission to remain will not be cancelled.



### Day of your ISD appointment

- Valid Passport
- Proof of Registration\*
- Proof of Fees Paid\*
- \*Proof of registration and proof of fees paid are in the same letter and can be generated and printed from your student portal (my.tcd.ie)
- Proof of finances (for non-visa-required nationals only): €10,000 for courses resulting in residence of greater than 8 months; €833 per month or €6,665 (in total) for courses resulting in residence of 8 months or less.
- Proof of Health Insurance, policy document is required
- €300 Fee (No cash accepted. Credit card or debit card)


#### **Proof of Registration Letter**

- Log on to my.tcd.ie portal
- Click on the 'Registration tab' for options of letters to print
- Click on 'Confirmation of Registration'
- Go to 'Intray' on the home tab.
- Your letter will be in your 'New Intray' or 'All intray messages'
- Click 'Proof of Registration' to open and print the file.



## Immigration Card (IRP)

- Called Irish Residence Permit (IRP) card
- Also known as a Stamp 2 (check expiry date, typically December)
- Allow for 10 working days for issue (by post)
- If not issued in 10 days, contact ISD
- Email: immigrationsupport@justice.ie
- \* Make sure to confirm the right address at your appointment





#### Entry visas for other countries

If you are planning to take a trip outside of Ireland:

- Check the visa requirements of the country you are going to
- Ensure you allow sufficient time to apply for your visa,
- Check if there are travel advisories or any restrictions before you travel:




### Schengen Visa

- A Schengen visa allows short-term visits (up to 90days in any 180-day period) to countries within the Schengen Area, which includes most of continental Europe.
- For requirements, check with the Embassy you're applying to. Documents required include many of those you needed to enter Ireland, as well as your IRP card (you'll get this after your ISD appointment), and Bookings (flights and accommodation).

Further details - please check the relevant country's embassy website.


Make your book the Schengen visa appointment in advance, it is in high demand!



### UK Visa (incl. Northern Ireland)

- Depending on your nationality and the purpose of your visit, you may either need a Visa or ETA (Electronic Travel Authorisation) to travel to UK.





## **Opening Requirements**

Documents that may be required to open a bank account:

- Proof of address in Ireland: Letter can be obtained from Academic Registry.
- Proof of ID: Passport.
- Bank Statement from your home country
- Other documents depending on each bank and students' nationality



#### Note

- Allow time for your account to become active
- If you will be <u>under 18</u> at the time of opening your bank account, you will need a guardian to accompany you to open a bank account
- When securing private accommodation, most letting agents and landlords will accept cash or bank draft (which you can obtain with a foreign debit card or cash in an Irish bank) for the first month's rent and security deposit, as long as you set up direct debit from an Irish account as soon as possible after opening your new bank account



## 5. Working in Ireland

- Non-EU Students attending a full degree full-time course with an Irish Residence Permit (IRP) card (Stamp 2) are entitled to take up casual employment
  - Non-EU citizens must register with Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) <u>before</u> commencing employment
  - 20 hours during term time, and 40 hours between December 15 - January 15 and June 1 -September 30 only
  - The right to work lapses automatically on expiry of immigration permission
- **EU passport-holders:** Have the same rights to work as Irish citizens



### How to get a PPS number

- A Personal Public Service (PPS) number is a unique reference number that everyone who works in Ireland must have
- It ensures that you can be registered with the Irish taxation authorities, known as the <u>Revenue</u> <u>Commissioners</u>
- Students will receive a PPS number only when you can show you have an offer to take up employment or need it to deal with a "specified body"
- To get a PPS number, you can apply online via email to the Department of Employment Affairs and Social Protection: <a href="https://www.gov.ie/en/service/12e6de-get-a-personal-public-service-pps-number/">https://www.gov.ie/en/service/12e6de-get-a-personal-public-service-pps-number/</a>



## What you need...

- A completed <u>application form</u> for the PPS Number.
- Evidence of your identity (passport)
- Evidence of why you need a PPS number allocated (e.g. job offer)
- Proof of your address. (Letter from Academic Registry or bank statement)



## 7. Safety



#### What is SafeZone?

This Trinity App increases the security and safety of students and staff while in a Trinity location. It provides immediate access to Trinity resources to provide assistance in cases of emergencies or when an alert is raised.

#### What is SafeZone used for?

SafeZone enables you to raise alerts (by pressing the emergency button on the App) or seek assistance when onsite in Trinity. Once an alert is raised, the user's location is shared with our security team who then respond. The App allows users to check-in for specific time periods and if they do not check-out within that period, an alert is automatically sent to security.

Further functionality will be delivered over the coming months, including sending Trinity notifications to our SafeZone registered students and staff.

#### How do I access SafeZone?

Just download the SafeZone app from the iOS or Android App stores, enter your TCD username and password, complete the registration form and you are good to go. You can opt to check in automatically (recommended) or manually check-in when required.






The types of thing we say...


## Different ways of communicating

- It takes time to get used to new accents




### Culture shock and homesickness

- Becoming comfortable outside your comfort zone




### Coping with change and settling in


